Pastoral Letter for November

Dear Trinity Church Members and Friends,

Happy birthday to you, Happy birthday to you, Happy birthday, Dear Martin Luther, Happy birthday to you!

Martin Luther was born on November 10, 1483, in the town of Eisleben, which is part of modern Germany. His mother's name was Marguerite. In English her name would be Daisy. His father's name was Hans. Hans had been a copper miner and worked his way into the middle class. His dream was that Martin would grow up to be a lawyer and support him in his old age. He was disappointed that Martin became a monk and priest. German parents, especially in that period of history, were known as strict disciplinarians, and Martin's parents certainly were that. Perhaps that added to his feelings of sinfulness and guilt as a young man, his *anfechtung*, that motivated his search for a loving, forgiving God.

It was customary at the time to baptize a baby as soon as possible after birth. Typically, that was the next day and Martin was baptized on St. Martin of Porres' Feast Day, November 11. Obviously, Martin was raised in a pious and religiously observant home. In Germany at that time. St. Martin's Day was considered the end of fall and the harvest season, and the beginning of winter, a time of reveling. The festivities included bonfires, parades with lanterns, and children going door-to-door to receive candy, kind of like our Halloween Trick-or -Treating. How appropriate that Luther's later insights and his re-discovery of the gospel would lead to much joy and rejoicing.

Martin was a bright and precocious child. As was often done among families that could afford it, at an early age Martin was sent to a boarding school where he received a classical education. He was well trained in the wisdom of the day. He also had musical talent and sang in choirs at school. This would serve him well later in life when he wrote hymns and liturgies.

We can see many God-ordained things working together in Martin Luther's young life that helped prepare him to the Great Reformer he became as an adult. What trajectory might God be creating for you in your life? What positive influence might you have on a young person that helps prepare him or her to be all that God intends for that person to be? These are good things to meditate upon on these autumnal days.

Council Highlights October 30, 2023

Attendance was 100% at this October meeting - and with our usual two quests, Tom and Judy Brainard. Business was brisk, much of it pertaining to our fiscal affairs, yet as you will discover in this article, Council embarked on a most insightful conversation that must be continued in the near future.

On behalf of Stewardship, Dick presented a proposal for investing \$95,000 of the ERTC monies as staggered term CDs. The interest rate is currently at or slightly above 5% vs. under 1% in the current money market account. Keeping our principal is quaranteed with a CD as compared with our other investments which seem to be a roller coaster ride of ups and downs. This motion was easily passed.

The initial phase of the roof project is now starting with Shea's realigning the positions of the rooftop drains. The roof company has somewhat modified their part and will do a short term fix, but we will be doing much more come spring by adding a tapered concept.

Marvin is looking into adding an automatic soap dispenser to the dishwasher as that will regulate the soap usage with less wasted soap. Past Sauerkraut monies will pay for this.

The proposed budget was thoroughly discussed line by line. Some adjustments were recommended for payroll, but actually totaling a slight decrease in overall payroll related expenses. Elders' requests are up slightly; most of their budget refers to altar supplies, monies to the Eastern District, bulletins, copyright fees. Office supplies are a slight increase. Paper and postage have become more costly. As of this perusal of this first draft, there likely will be a shortfall of approximately \$45,000 during 2024. Diminishing investments is the concern.

This probable deficit sparked a more in-depth dialogue leading to the need of a serious conversation about the future in terms of finance, facility, education.... all of our programming. What are our priorities? Is there an alternative source of funding? Could we rent the basement? Where are people capable and willing to fill positions for the business end of church operations?

Our by-laws appear dated to the 1950s and are limiting to the current large number of positions. Considering our attendance and availability of able and committed souls, it seems the number of leadership positions: committee members, needed choir members, readers, ushers, altar assistants, Men's Club, and Ladies Aid attendees outweigh the available persons.

Pastor, in his numbers' example, started with 75 potential active members, as if all were present on the same Sunday, quickly reducing it by about 25 children, very elderly, and shut-in persons, further eliminating 25 or so simply not interested in participating in various capacities, and ending up with about 25 who might be interested, capable, and willing. Of those final 25, many wear several hats. We have one who sings, manages sound, makes CDs, is on Elders, attends Bible class; there are others who are very similar. One cooks, provide music of various sorts, supervises large meal gatherings, participates in Ladies Aid, etc. Many of our people are most dedicated and are very busy in a variety of capacities. No one person is being singled out; they are many within this smaller group – and we are thankful for all of them!

Times have changed. Maybe it is time for us to rethink our operations structure; i.e. downsize the number of elected positions; have fewer obligatory meetings... Such was Council "off 'on a tangent", brainstorming, thoughtful conversation. Food for thought for a future meeting.

The proposed budget will be shared with all in mid-November. New officers are needed unless the current ones choose to continue -this is the hoped-for outcome.

Needed: Vice Chairperson, Treasurer, Properties, and Elders.

(Hint - Hint - Hint..... Twist a few arms-those belonging to current officers Carol Barnes, Rich Shear, and Linda (Linda currently has only has one arm - somebody get after her!) New blood is most welcome. Speak to Pastor or Carol E.

Once again it was a productive meeting, lively, and even with some good laughter.

The next meeting is November 27 at 6 PM.

Beginning September 25, 2023, <u>every household</u> can again place an order to receive <u>four more free COVID-19 rapid tests</u> delivered directly to their home. Visit <u>special.USPS.com/testkits</u>.

How do I order free COVID-19 tests from USPS?

When USPS starts taking orders for COVID-19 tests on September 25th, you'll only need to provide a few bits of information to get your kits. You won't be asked to provide any credit or debit card details, as both the tests and the shipping are free. Here's how to get your kits once the order process begins.

- 1. Visit special.USPS.com/testkits.
- 2. Enter your contact details and shipping information.
- 3. Click Check Out Now.
- 4. Verify that your information is correct and select Place My Order.

All orders will be shipped via First Class Package Service.


CONGRATULATIONS!
